

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# Executive Summary

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The 2013 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Occupational/Career Information unit of the Labor Market Information Section to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Investment Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2009 to 2013, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2013 to 2015.

Arkansas increased in population by 9,545 to almost 3 million residents in 2013, ranking the state 32nd in the United States for total population. Of Arkansas's 10 Workforce Investment Areas, Northwest Arkansas experienced the largest population growth, adding 9,533 new residents in 2013. The Eastern, North Central, Southeast, Southwest, West Central, and Western Arkansas WIAs saw decreasing populations in 2013.

The state's labor force and employment both decreased between 2012 and 2013, at 18,100 and 17,600 respectively. Labor Force and employment were mixed across the Workforce Areas. The State's unemployment rate remained steady between 2012 and 2013 but the State saw the unemployment rate drop one percentage point by June 2014. It was a mix of increasing and decreasing unemployment and unemployment rates across the 10 WIAs in 2013. Northwest Arkansas WIA's unemployment rate continued to remain below state levels through 2013 at 6.0 percent, while the Eastern Arkansas WIA had an unemployment rate of 10.5 in 2013.

Employment in Arkansas is projected to increase by 1.45 percent between 2013 and 2015. The Services-Providing industries should add 19,157 new jobs, while Goods-Producing industries are predicted to lose 430 jobs. Arkansas is projected to gain 92 self-employed and unpaid family workers for the workforce.

The Services-Providing industries should see a modest growth overall during the 2013-2015 projection period. In this group, the top growing industry supersector for net growth is projected to be Professional and Business Services with a projected gain of 7,136 jobs. The Goods-Producing industries could see a net loss of 430 jobs with gains of 343 in Construction and losses of 230 in the Natural Resources and Mining supersector and a loss of 543 in Manufacturing.

Jobs requiring less than a High School Diploma are estimated to add more jobs than any other education level with 5,863 jobs between 2013 and 2015. Of jobs that require experience beyond formal training, those requiring less than 5 years of experience could have 2,291 new jobs and have 3,852 annual openings. Short-Term On-the-Job Training remains the top training level beyond formal education with 7,951 new jobs and 19,477 annual job openings.

Arkansas's per capita personal income increased over the 2008-2012 period to \$35,437; however, the state's income in 2012 remained at approximately 81 percent of the United States per capita income. During the second quarter of 2014, the cost of living composite index in Arkansas's urban areas was below the national average for all urban areas in the index.

Almost 500,000 Arkansas workers earned at least \$10 to nearly \$20 dollars an hour, with the mean wage for all employer sizes being \$37,340 a year. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest wage that was 19 percent higher than the average annual wage for Arkansas.

# State of Arkansas

The State of Arkansas's population grew to 2,959,373 in 2013, adding 9,545 residents from 2012 to 2013 and 62,530 from 2009 to 2013. The State of Arkansas consists of 10 Local Workforce Investment Areas, six Metropolitan Statistical Areas, and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the State.


Job creation saw a decrease between the first quarter 2012 and the first quarter 2013 to 46,961. Job creation has also seen a decrease over the past five years, with a decrease of 6,326 compared to the first quarter of 2009. New hires had a small decrease from the first quarter of 2012 to first quarter of 2013, but has seen an increase since the first quarter of 2009 with 3,323 additional new hires for the first quarter of 2013. Separations decreased by 5,585 compared to the first quarter of 2012, and the turnover rate increased between 2012 and 2013. The turnover rate increased two-tenths of a percentage point, to 8.9 percent in the first quarter of 2013.



Both the labor force and employment decreased between 2012 and 2013. The labor force decreased by 18,100 to 1,326,500 workers in 2013, while employment decreased by 17,600. Both have also seen a decrease since 2009. The number of unemployed decreased by 500 workers from 2012 to 2013, and the unemployment rate remained stable over the same period to total 7.5 percent of the labor force in 2013. However, the State's unemployment rate had decreased 1.2 percentage points by June 2014 to 6.3 percent.



**About the Index:** The Council for Community and Economic Research (C2ER) produces the *Cost of Living Index* to provide a useful and reasonably accurate measure of living cost differences among urban areas. Items on which the Index is based have been carefully chosen to reflect the different categories of consumer expenditures. Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

**Interpreting the Index:** The *Cost of Living Index* measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.

Based on the composite cost of living index, goods and services in Fayetteville, Arkansas were 89.2 percent of the national average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, for the second quarter of 2014.


Also, given composite indexes for Jonesboro (86.7) and Little Rock-North Little Rock (97.2) a move from Jonesboro to Little Rock would require about a 12% increase in after-taxes income to maintain the same lifestyle.

The *Index* does not measure inflation (price change over time). Because each quarterly report is a separate comparison of prices at a single point in time, and because both the number and the mix of participants changes from one quarter to the next, Index data from different quarters cannot be compared. For inflation data, contact the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics.

2008-2012**







## Wages

*Retail Salespersons* was the largest occupation in the State in 2013 with an average annual wage of \$23,910. *Truck Drivers, Heavy and Tractor-Trailer* was the second largest occupation with 32,960 estimated employees earning an average annual wage of \$36,600. *Registered Nurses*, with an estimated employment of 23,480, had the highest average annual wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$56,150 annually.

All but one of the state's occupations paying the most, are in the **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical** major group. *Obstetricians and Gynecologists* topped the list with an annual salary of \$246,750. With an average annual salary of \$233,920, *Anesthesiologists* ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.






The mean wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$37,340 for 2013. Experienced wage estimates for employers with 250-499 employees was \$45,537, while entry wages were above \$16,500 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 1,152,603 employees making an hourly wage rate, 318,044 made \$7.50 to \$9.99 an hour. Employees making \$7.50 or below totaled 15,481.

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Overall, the Arkansas job market is expected to add 18,819 jobs between 2013 and 2015, a 1.45 percent rise in employment. *Employment Services* leads all industries in net growth with a projected increase of 1,932 jobs, bringing its employment to 24,068 by 2015. *Resin, Synthetic Rubber, and Artificial Synthetic Fibers and Filaments Manufacturing* is likely to continue to show strong growth; and is predicted to be the fastest growing industry in the state, growing at a rate of 82.82 percent between 2013 and 2015. *Ventilation, Heating, Air-Conditioning, and Commercial Refrigeration Equipment Manufacturing* could see the worst industry outlook with an anticipated decline of 501 jobs. *Audio and Video Equipment Manufacturing* continues its downward trend as the fastest declining industry in the state, with a projected loss of 41.81 percent.

## Occupations

In terms of annual job openings, 40,578 are expected to be available each year of the 2013 thru 2015 projection period. Growth and expansion is expected to account for 10,654 of these openings, while 29,924 would be to replace current employees. *Personal Care Aides* tops all occupations in net growth with 881 projected new jobs, bringing employment to 15,582 by 2015. *Chemical Equipment Operators and Tenders* is expected to increase employment by 18.28 percent, a little more than 100 new jobs. *Retail Salespersons* is expected to lead the state in annual job openings with 1,780. *Childcare Workers* is expected to be cut by 189, due in large part to federal cuts to Head Start Programs, but there should still be over 11,000 workers in this profession. *Desktop Publishers* is expected to be the fastest declining occupation in the state with a 10.56 percent decline in employment.

# Central Arkansas WIA

The Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area population increased by 5,544 to 514,720 between 2012 and 2013 and has seen an increase in population of 26,167 over the 2009-2013 period. Central Arkansas WIA includes a large portion of the Little Rock-North Little Rock-Conway Metropolitan Statistical Area and six counties: Faulkner, Lonoke, Monroe, Prairie, Saline, and Pulaski County, excluding Little Rock.


There were 7,605 new jobs created in the first quarter of 2013 compared to 7,950 new jobs created in the first quarter of 2012. The number of new hires and the number of separations decreased slightly in the first quarter of 2013 from the same time period in 2012. 

The Area saw a decrease in the labor force and employment from 2012 to 2013, but over the 2009-2013 period, the Area has seen an increase in both. The labor force lost 1,500 in 2013 while employment saw a decrease of 1,625. Since 2009, the Area has had an increase of 4,100 in the labor force and an increase of 2,975 in employment. But the Area has also seen an increase in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2012 to 2013, there was an increase of 125 in unemployment and from 2009 to 2013 the Area saw an increase of 1,125. The Area's unemployment rate increased by one-tenth of a percentage point to 6.7 percent for 2013, but the unemployment rate increased by four-tenths of a percentage point over the five-year period. In 2014, the unemployment rate decreased by one percentage point to 5.7 percent by June.



## Wages

*Cashiers*, with an estimated employment of 2,610, was the largest occupation in the Area in 2013, with an estimated average wage of \$17,879. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food* had the next largest estimated employment with 2,333, earning an estimated average annual wage of \$17,258. *Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers* had the largest estimated average annual wage of all the occupations on the list at \$35,251.

With an estimated average annual salary of \$191,993, *Family and General Practitioners* led the Occupations Paying the Most list in 2013. Five management occupations populated the list with an average annual salary estimate above \$100,000.





Employers of all sizes saw a mean wage estimate of \$36,346 in 2013 with an estimated experience wage of \$45,764. Employers with 500 or more employees had the largest estimated mean wage at \$46,194. Estimated entry wages ranged from \$16,819 for employers with 50-99 employees to \$21,887 for employers with 500 or more employees.

Of the 79,295 total number of employees by hourly wage rate in 2013, 24,302 employees made an hourly wage in the \$7.50-\$9.99 range. Employees making more than \$25.00 an hour totaled 13,436. Note: Wage data for Central Arkansas WIA does not include Pulaski County.

# Central Arkansas WIA

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## Industry

The Central Arkansas WIA is expected to add 1,432 jobs between 2013 and 2015, an increase of 0.85 percent. *Administrative and Support Services* is projected to lead all industries in net growth with an anticipated 309 new jobs, bringing employment to 9,626. *Warehousing and Storage* could increase by 15.17 percent, adding 191 new jobs to its workforce. On the flip side of the economy, *Insurance Carriers and Related Activities* is estimated to lose 191 jobs, bringing employment below 1,500 during the projection period. *Wood Product Manufacturing* could lose more than a quarter of its workforce with a loss of 115 jobs anticipated.

## Occupations

The Central Arkansas WIA is expected to have 5,062 annual job openings each year of the 2013-2015 projection period, with 1,044 for growth and expansion and 4,018 for replacement of current employees. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food* is projected to lead all occupations in net growth with 95 new jobs, bringing employment numbers to 3,247. *Information Security Analysts* could increase employment by 7.34 percent making it the fastest growing occupation in the Area. *Retail Salespersons* is projected to lead all occupations in annual openings with 258. *Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* is estimated to lose 66 jobs during the projection period, bringing employment down to 3,950. *Sawing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Wood* could see a 24.53 percent cut from its workforce making it the fastest declining occupation in the Area.



The City of Little Rock WIA is the county seat of Pulaski County and includes part of the Little Rock-North Little Rock-Conway Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Job creation added 5,504 in the first quarter of 2013, or 406 more jobs than the same quarter in 2012. But, this is still less compared to the first quarter of 2009 when 7,252 jobs were created in the Area. The number of new hires and the number of separations both decreased between the 2012 and 2013 first quarters. For the first quarter of 2013, there were 111 new hires and 389 fewer separations compared to the same time period of 2012. The turnover rate was 8 percent for the first quarter of 2013.





*Retail Salespersons* was the largest occupation in 2013 with 8,840 estimated employees with an estimated annual average wage of \$27,339. *Registered Nurses* was the second largest occupation with an estimated employment of 8,380 and an estimated annual average wage of \$60,432. *General and Operations Managers* had the highest estimated average wage of the Top 10 largest occupations at \$92,168, and had 4,338 estimated employees in 2013.

*Obstetricians and Gynecologists* topped the list of occupations paying the most with an estimated annual salary of \$262,720 for the Area. With an estimated average annual salary of \$237,938, *Family and General Practitioners* ranked second on the list. *Computer and Information Systems Managers* completed the Top 10 list, earning an estimated \$106,452 in 2013.





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## Industry

The City of Little Rock WIA is expected to grow by 3,784 between 2013 and 2015, or an increase of 2.08 percent.

*Administrative and Support Services* is projected to be the top growing industry with a growth of 687, bringing employment totals above 10,000. *Sporting Goods, Hobby, Book, and Music Stores* could increase employment by 46.38 percent to an employment level of 890. *Food Manufacturing* is estimated to have the worst outlook among the industries in the Area with a 217 job loss, or 29.01 percent of its workforce.

## Occupations

Employers in the City of Little Rock WIA could have 6,214 annual job openings for the 2013-2015 projection period, second most of the WIAs in the state. Growth and expansion is estimated to account for 2,096 of those job openings, while 4,118 would be available each year for the replacement of workers who leave their particular profession. *Retail Salespersons* is projected to add 196 new jobs to its workforce bringing its employment total to 5,757. The occupation is also forecast to have the most annual job openings with 302 between 2013 and 2015. *Grinding, Lapping, Polishing, and Buffing Machine Tool Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* is set to be the fastest growing occupation increasing by 16.42 percent. *Data Entry Keyers* is projected to lose the most jobs in the Area with 23 jobs anticipated to be cut. *Food Batchmakers* could lose 20 percent of its workforce making it the fastest declining occupation.











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## Industry

The Eastern Arkansas WIA is projected to add 227 jobs to the local economy between 2013 and 2015, equivalent to a 0.54 percent increase. *Social Assistance* is estimated to add 141 new jobs bringing its employment to 2,570. Jobs in *Waste Management and Remediation Service* could increase by 72.29 percent moving from 83 in 2013 to 143 in 2015. *Educational Services* is estimated to lose 130 jobs, which translates to 2.58 percent of its workforce. *Nonmetallic Mineral Product Manufacturing* is anticipated to be the fastest declining industry cutting 42 jobs, or 38.53 percent of its workforce.

## Occupations

The Eastern Arkansas WIA is estimated to have 1,382 annual job openings during the 2013-2015 projection period. Of the WIAs in the state, the Area is expected to see the smallest gap between annual growth openings and replacement openings with 406 for growth and expansion and 976 for replacement. *Team Assemblers* is predicted to be the top and fastest growing occupation in the Area with a gain of 104 jobs, or a 34.44 percent increase in employment, bringing employment to 406. *Cashiers* is projected to have the most annual job openings with 72, but is also predicted to lose the most jobs, overall, with a loss of 46 jobs between 2013 and 2015. *Insurance Sales Agents* could see a 14.13 percent drop in jobs, equivalent to a loss of 26.

# North Central Arkansas WIA

The North Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area saw a decrease in population in 2013, losing 601 residents bringing the population to 238,087. But this is an increase from 2009 with the Area gaining 1,519 residents over the five-year period. The North Central Arkansas WIA consists of 10 counties: Cleburne, Fulton, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Sharp, Stone, Van Buren, White, and Woodruff, with the state of Missouri bordering the area to the north.







*Cashiers*, with an estimated employment of 2,927 was the largest occupation in the Area with an average annual wage of \$17,995 in 2013. *Registered Nurses* had the largest average annual wage of the 10 largest occupations at \$52,723 and had an estimated employment of 1,386 for the Area.

*Surgeons* topped the Occupations Paying the Most list, earning an average annual salary of \$255,119. *Internists, General* was second with an average annual salary of \$239,079. *Chief Executives* with an average annual salary of \$105,102 was the only occupation on the list not in the Healthcare Practitioners and Technical occupations major group.





# North Central Arkansas WIA

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## Industry

The North Central Arkansas WIA is projected to add 2,289 new jobs to the labor market between 2013 and 2015. At 2.80 percent, the Area is estimated to be the fastest growing WIA in the state. *General Merchandise Stores* is set to lead all industries in net growth with an anticipated gain of 279 jobs, bringing its total workforce to 2,860 by 2015. *Machinery Manufacturing* could be the fastest growing industry, raising employment by 26.60 percent, to a level of 733. *Transportation Equipment Manufacturing* could see a tough outlook during the 2013-2015 time period with a loss of 225 jobs, or 22.57 percent of its workforce, making it the top and fastest declining industry in the Area.

## Occupations

The North Central Arkansas WIA is projected to have 3,147 annual job openings between 2013 and 2015. Of these, 1,270 would be for growth and expansion, while 1,877 would be for replacement of current staff. *Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* is estimated to be the top growing occupation with a gain of 841 new jobs, bringing employment to 8,921. The occupation is also projected to have the most annual job openings with 548. *Ophthalmic Laboratory Technicians* is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation, growing by 14.29 percent. *Welders, Cutters, Solderers, and Brazers* could see a loss of 21 jobs, while *Painters, Transportation Equipment* is estimated to cut 21.33 percent of its workforce.







*Retail Salespersons* was the largest occupation of 2013 for the Northwest Arkansas WIA with an estimated employment of 3,172, earning an average annual wage of \$22,470. The second largest was *Laborers and Freight, Stock, and Material Movers, Hand* with an estimated employment of 2,921 and an average wage of 22,445. *Registered Nurses* had the largest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, at \$52,853 annually.





Employers of all sizes had a mean wage of \$33,606 in Northeast Arkansas for 2013. Employers with 500 or more employees had the highest estimated mean wage at \$38,106 and the highest estimated entry wage at \$21,274. Estimated entry wages for the Area were above \$16,900 for employers of all sizes in 2013.

# Northeast Arkansas WIA

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## Industry

The Northeast Arkansas WIA is projected to add 2,632 new jobs to the local economy during the 2013 thru 2015 projection period, equivalent to a 2.53 percent rise in employment. *Ambulatory Health Care Services* is estimated to be the top growing industry, adding 604 jobs for a total employment of 4,984, a 13.79 percent increase. *Support Activities for Transportation* leads the Area in percent growth with an anticipated 43.59 percent rise in employment bringing its employment to 728. *Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing* is projected to lose the most jobs with 97 jobs estimated to be lost, bringing employment down to 894. *Motion Picture and Sound Recording Industries* could lose 29.59 percent of its workforce between 2013 and 2015.

## Occupations

The Northeast Arkansas WIA is expected to have 3,857 annual job openings between 2013 and 2015. Of these, 1,431 would be for growth and expansion, while 2,426 would be for the replacement of current workers. *Team Assemblers* is projected to add the most jobs, increasing by 112 to an employment level of 3,114. *Cargo and Freight Agents* could see a 38.46 percent rise in employment between 2013 and 2015. *Retail Salespersons* leads all occupations in the Area with 180 annual job openings. *Claims Adjusters, Examiners, and Investigators* is forecast to be the top declining occupation losing 13 jobs during the 2013-2015 projection period. *Conservation Scientists* could lose 23.08 percent of its workforce.









# Northwest Arkansas WIA

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## Industry

The Northwest Arkansas WIA is expected to increase employment by 1.95 percent over the 2013 thru 2015 projection period, a gain of 5,283 jobs. *Management of Companies and Enterprises* is projected to add 1,259 new jobs, bringing employment to 23,547, making it the top growing industry. *Chemical Manufacturing* is predicted to be the fastest growing industry, raising employment levels 16.96 percent, to a total of 262 by 2015. On the other side of the economy, *Food Manufacturing* could see cuts of 225 jobs, a 1.62 percent loss in its workforce. *Mining (except Oil and Gas)* is forecast to see a loss of 15.93 percent of its workforce.

## Occupations

The Northwest Arkansas WIA is estimated to have 9,243 annual job openings between 2013 and 2015. Openings associated with growth and expansion of companies is anticipated to account for 3,021 of those jobs, while 6,222 would be for replacing the current workforce. *Personal Care Aides* leads the Area in projected net growth with 243 new jobs, bringing job levels to 3,320. *Food Scientists and Technologists* is expected to be the fastest growing occupation with a growth of 12.79 percent, bringing employment to 247 by 2015. *Retail Salespersons* is expected to have the most annual job openings with 421 anticipated. *Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* could be the top declining occupation, losing 361 jobs between 2013 and 2015. However, there would still be an estimated 11,181 jobs in that profession. *Reporters and Correspondents* could see an 8.03 percent cut in jobs, bringing employment down to 126.

# Southeast Arkansas WIA

The population in the Southeast Arkansas Workforce Investment Area decreased by 2,248 to 207,768 in 2013 and has seen a decrease of 6,622 residents from 2009 to 2013. The Southeast Arkansas WIA includes the Pine Bluff Metropolitan Statistical Area and 10 counties: Arkansas, Ashley, Bradley, Chicot, Cleveland, Desha, Drew, Grant, Jefferson, and Lincoln. Louisiana and Mississippi border the Area.


Total job creation in Southeast Arkansas saw a slight decrease of 74 to 3,248 for the first quarter of 2013 compared to the first quarter of 2012, but new hires were 456 more for the same time period for a total of 9,305. Separations and turnovers increased in the Area with separations increasing by 586 and turnover increasing by one-tenth of a percentage point to 8.6 percent.



The Area saw a decrease in the labor force, employment, and unemployment from 2012 to 2013. The labor force decreased by 2,175 to 91,075, while employment decreased by 1,975. Both the labor force and employment has decreased every year since 2009. Unemployment saw a decrease of 200 to 8,725 from 2012 to 2013, with the Area seeing its largest number of unemployed in 2010 at 10,350. The unemployment rate remained steady, with the annual rate at 9.6 percent in 2013. The Area's monthly unemployment rate dropped sharply from January to June of 2014. The unemployment rate decreased during these months by two and three-tenths percentage points to 8.2 percent.



## Wages

*Retail salespersons* had the largest estimated employment for the Area with 1,797 employed, making an average annual wage of \$21,563 in 2013. *Cashiers* had the second largest estimated employment with 1,774 employed. *Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers* had the largest average annual wage of the 10 largest occupations, making an average annual wage of \$34,317 in 2013.

*Psychiatrists* was the occupation paying the most in 2013, with an average annual salary of \$244,986. *Family and General Practitioners* was second on the list, making an average annual wage of \$213,568, while *Marketing Managers* rounded out the Occupations Paying the Most list with an average annual salary of \$94,586.





# Southeast Arkansas WIA

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## Industry

The Southeast Arkansas WIA is expected to experience a loss of 899 jobs between 2013 and 2015, equivalent to a loss of 1.08 percent. *Administrative and Support Services* is projected to be the top growing industry adding 135 jobs, bringing employment to 1,503. *Warehousing and Storage* is estimated to be the fastest growing industry increasing employment by 14.02 percent. *Federal Government, Excluding Post Office* is forecast to decrease by 264 jobs, or 14.48 percent of its workforce. *Printing and Related Support Activities* could lose 19.44 percent of its workforce between 2013 and 201

## Occupations

Despite the overall loss of jobs in the Southeast Arkansas WIA during the 2013-2015 projections period, employers are still projected to have 211 annual openings for growth and expansion purposes. Openings to replace workers who leave, comes to 1,875, bringing the total anticipated annual openings to 2,086. *Personal Care Aids* leads all occupations in projected net growth with 40 new jobs anticipated between 2013 and 2015. *Taxi Drivers and Chauffeurs* is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation increasing by 4.74 percent, bringing employment to 221. *Cashiers* is forecast to lead in the number of annual job openings with 114 between 2013 and 2015. *Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* is estimated to be the top declining occupation with a loss of 47 jobs. *Couriers and Messengers* could lose 20 percent of its workforce making it the fastest declining occupation.

# Southwest Arkansas WIA

The Southwest Arkansas Workforce Investment Area's population decreased by 1,542 to 228,638 residents in 2013. The Area has seen a decline in population over the 2009-2013 period, losing 3,953 residents since 2009. Southwest Arkansas is the largest Workforce Area in the state in terms of the number of counties represented. Twelve counties are located within this region: Calhoun, Columbia, Dallas, Hempstead, Howard, Lafayette, Little River, Miller, Nevada, Ouachita, Sevier, and Union. Three states border the Area: Oklahoma to the west, Texas to the southwest, and Louisiana to the south. Miller County is part of the Texarkana AR/TX Metropolitan Statistical Area


The number of new jobs created in the first quarter of 2013 fell by 260 to 3,073 compared to 3,333 jobs created during the same time period in 2012. 

The labor force decreased by 3,700 from 2012 to 2013 to 97,050 and has seen a decrease of 9,150 in the labor force compared to 2009. Employment and unemployment decreased between 2012 and 2013. Employment decreased by 3,575, while unemployment decreased by 125. The unemployment rate increased by two-tenths of a percentage point from 2012 to include 8.3 percent of the labor force in 2013. 





The mean wage estimate for all sizes of employers in Southwest Arkansas was \$33,785 in 2013. Employers with 100 to 249 employees had an estimated mean wage of \$34,020. Estimated entry wages for the area for all employer sizes fell below \$20,035.

# Southwest Arkansas WIA

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## Industry

The Southwest Arkansas WIA is estimated to add 127 jobs between 2013 and 2015, an increase of 0.14 percent. *Plastics and Rubber Products Manufacturing* is projected to be the top and fastest growing industry in the Area adding 265 jobs during the projection period, an increase of 9.60 percent and bringing employment to 3,024. *Paper Manufacturing* is predicted to lose 144 jobs bringing employment down to 1,327. *Computer and Electronic Product Manufacturing* is anticipated to experience a 36.36 percent drop in its workforce going from 88 in 2013 to 56 in 2015.

## Occupations

The Southwest Arkansas WIA is predicted to have 2,420 annual openings between 2013 and 2015. Of those, 362 are anticipated for growth and expansion, while 2,058 would be available for the replacement of current employees who leave their job. *Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers* is expected to be the top growing occupation adding 50 new jobs and bringing employment to 3,185. *Personal Financial Advisors* could be the fastest growing occupation increasing by 12.50 percent. *Cashiers* is forecast to have the most annual job openings with 121 anticipated, all for the replacement of current staff. *Construction Laborers and Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers* are tied for the top declining occupation with a loss of 23 jobs each. *Electrical Engineers* could see a 22.58 percent drop in employment by March 2015.





Unemployment and the unemployment rate increased from 2012. Unemployment increased to 10,850 and the unemployment rate increased two-tenths of a percentage point to 7.8 percent. After a spike in the unemployment rate in January 2014, unemployment dropped by one and sixth-tenths of a percentage point by June to 6.6 percent.







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## Industry

The West Central Arkansas WIA is expected to see an increase of 1,585 jobs between 2013 and 2015, equivalent to a 1.29 percent rise in employment. *Ambulatory Health Care Services* is projected to be the top growing industry with an increase of 240 jobs bringing employment to 5,242. *Crop Production* is anticipated to grow by 28.99 percent, adding 20 jobs between 2013 and 2015. *Warehousing and Storage* is predicted to lose the most jobs, cutting 57 jobs from its workforce, bringing employment down to 1,106. *Textile Product Mills* could see an 18.52 percent decline in its workforce.

## Occupations

The West Central Arkansas WIA is projected to have 3,828 annual job openings during the 2013-2015 projection period. Of these, 958 would be for growth and expansion, while 2,870 would be for replacement of current staff. *Customer Service Representatives* is expected to lead all occupations in net growth with an increase of 68, bringing employment to 1,917. *Aircraft Mechanics and Service Technicians* could see an 11.76 rise in employment, making it the fastest growing occupation in the Area. *Cashiers* is forecasted to have the most annual openings with 186 anticipated between 2013 and 2015. *Sewing Machine Operators* is estimated to be the top and fastest declining occupation with a loss of 30 jobs, or 9.43 percent of its workforce, bringing employment down to 288 by 2015.











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## Industry

The Western Arkansas WIA is predicted to add 1,125 new jobs to the local economy during the 2013-2015 projection period, which is a 0.98 percent rise in employment. *Administrative and Support Services* is estimated to be the top growing industry, adding 769 jobs for a total employment of 6,679, a 13.01 percent increase. *Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services* is projected to be the fastest growing industry, increasing by 23.20 to a level of 2,522 jobs. *Machinery Manufacturing* is estimated to be the top and fastest declining industry with a loss of 348 jobs, equivalent to 26.26 percent of its workforce, bringing employment down to 977 by 2015.

## Occupations

The Western Arkansas WIA is expected to have 3,612 annual job openings between 2013 and 2015. Of these, 967 would be for growth and expansion, while 2,645 would be for replacement of current workers. *Waiters and Waitresses* is projected to add the most jobs, increasing by 79 jobs to an employment level of 2,072. The occupation also leads in the number of projected total annual openings with 144. *Veterinary Assistants and Laboratory Animal Caretakers* could see a 21.82 percent rise in employment between 2013 and 2015. *Team Assemblers* is forecast to be the top declining occupation losing 166 jobs during the 2013-2015 projection period, bringing employment down to 1,491. A 14 percent decline in *Cabinetmakers and Bench Carpenters* would make the occupation the fastest declining occupation in the Area.
