Introduction

The annual Economic Review for West Virginia is prepared by the Research, Information and Analysis Division of WorkForce West Virginia. The 2013 edition delivers a detailed appraisal of the economies of the state and its seven workforce investment areas. The information contained within is derived from multiple surveys covering various aspects of the economy, and can be utilized by those responsible for public policy, economic development, education, job training and career counseling. Data in the Economic Review are revised frequently, and are accessible on the Division's web site at www.workforcewv.org/lmi.

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Workforce Investment Areas

Each area includes demographic, census, labor force, nonfarm payroll employment, wage data, largest employer listing, occupational demand, industry employment projections showing growth and decline.

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State Economic Activity

The number of jobs in West Virginia, reflected in total nonfarm payroll employment, was virtually unchanged over the year falling 2,000 or a mere 0.3 percent. Within the labor force, however, those employed or actively seeking employment declined 8,700. The number of unemployed individuals decreased 7,600, which translated to an unemployment rate of 6.5 percent. The 2013 rate of unemployment was down nearly a full percentage point from the 2012 rate of 7.3 percent. Although the data may appear contradictory, it more accurately depicts a statewide economy that is expanding at a lethargic pace and further indicates a regional economy, including our neighboring states, that is as slow to expand or even more sluggish than our own.

Of the 763,000 total jobs in 2013 the goods-producing sector overshadowed any gains in the service producing sector by losing 3,600. The impetus for this decline occurred in mining and logging (-1,700), construction (-1,300) and manufacturing (-700). The service-providing sector provides essentially 85 percent of all jobs in West Virginia. However, during 2013 an expansion of 1,700 jobs was imperceptible in the statewide economy. Service producing losses were recorded in trade, transportation, and utilities (-300), information (-100), and other services (-100). Sectors adding jobs included financial activities (+500), professional and business services (+500), education and health services (+600), leisure and hospitality (+400), and total government (+200). Three of the sectors provide more than half of the 771,000 jobs in the state. They include total government (153,700), trade, transportation and utilities (135,300), and education and health services (126,200).

County unemployment rates during 2013 were encouraging as nearly all improved. However, there were 33 counties whose average annual rate exceeded the state rate of 6.4 percent and five that remained in double digit territory. Included in this group are Clay (11.5%), Webster (11.5%), Mingo (11.0%), Mason (10.1%), and McDowell (10.0%). McDowell also claimed the distinction of the only county whose rate increased in the twelve month interim. All others posted declining unemployment rates except for Nicholas whose rate was unchanged. The lowest rate for 2013 was recorded by Monongalia County (4.1%) and along with Jefferson County (4.6%), they were the only counties with rates less than 5 percent.

All workforce investment areas in the state recorded declining unemployment rates for 2013. Workforce Investment Area 6 (5.4%) posted the lowest rate for the year followed by areas 3 (5.7%) and 7 (6.0%). The remaining four areas registered rates higher than the state rate and included Workforce Investment Area 1 (7.6%), Workforce Investment Area 2 (6.7%), Workforce Investment Area 4 (7.4%), and Workforce Investment Area 5 (7.5%).

The Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) for 2013 recorded a slight decline in the average annual employment of less than one percent. Employment stood at 710,734 in 2012 and a year later had fallen 7,017 to the 2013 annual average of 703,717. Primary growth industries included educational and health services (+516), trade transportation and utilities (+468), professional and business services (+298), and leisure and hospitality (+218). These employment gains were offset by losses in government (-4,248), natural resources and mining (-1,847), construction (-1,294), manufacturing (-675), other services (-124), information (-106), and financial activities (-94). Although employment was down over the year, West Virginia workers realized an increase in their average annual wage of \$478 in 2013,

which grew to a level of \$40,199. This represents an expansion of approximately 1.2 percent over the 2012 amount when the average wage stood at \$39,721.

Statewide per capita personal income grew 3.7 percent or \$1,260 during 2012 to an average of \$35,082. By comparison, the U.S. average increased \$1,437 to \$43,735, or 3.4 percent from the previous year. Eleven counties across the state recorded per capita personal income greater than the statewide average. These counties include Cabell (\$35,385), Lewis (\$38,277), Marshall (\$38,309), Raleigh (\$38,529), Marion (\$38,608), Ohio (\$39,020), Monongalia (\$39,161), Jefferson (\$39,739), Harrison (\$42,060), Putnam (\$42,583), and Kanawha (\$44,660). Kanawha also claimed the distinction as the single county whose per capita personal income exceeded the national average.

West Virginia's population in 2013, as estimated by the U.S. Census Bureau, declined 2,376 residents to a level of 1,854,304. This represents a marginal loss of one tenth of one percent. Monongalia County (+1,747), Berkeley (+1,570), and Jefferson County (+515) recorded the largest numerical gains over the year. The five most populated counties in 2013 were ranked the same as the previous year. The group is comprised of Kanawha (191,275), Berkeley (108,706), Monongalia (102,274), Cabell (97,133), and Wood (86,569).

The West Virginia economy continues to move forward, regrettably at a ponderous pace. Coal is generally the economic spark that ignites much of the statewide activity. While domestic demand for coal has been rather flat, it has been the international market in the past that has provided the greatest demand. Global demand, however, has lagged some the past year following periods of considerable growth. Although the recent winter in the U.S. was colder than normal and quite challenging, it did not produce a demand for coal above or beyond typical levels of supply. Closure of older coal fired power plants and abundant supplies of domestic natural gas continue to contribute to a coal industry malaise. Not unexpectedly, this has adversely affected statewide revenue. An added drag on the state economy has come from the gambling industry. In years past they have literally been the only game in town, in particular for the mid-Atlantic region. However, increased and substantial competition from Pennsylvania, Ohio, and now Maryland casinos, has produced noticeably less revenue for state gaming establishments. As always, an improving West Virginia economy, which includes the health of coal and associated industries, will be predicated in part on an expanding national economy and healthy international markets.

Economic Indicators

Preliminary data from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis indicates significant growth in real gross domestic (GDP) product for West Virginia in 2013. The 5.1 percent expansion in the state GDP was surpassed by only Wyoming (+7.6%) and North Dakota (+9.7%). As in previous years, coal mining and its companion industries were the primary components moving the West Virginia economy forward. In recent years, however, an added boost to the GDP has come from the natural gas industry and more specifically, the Marcellus Shale segment of gas production. Explanatory Notes:

Definitions. GDP by state is the state counterpart of the Nation's gross domestic product (GDP), the Bureau's featured and most comprehensive measure of U.S. economic activity. GDP by state is derived as the sum of the GDP originating in all the industries in a state.

The statistics of real GDP by state are prepared in chained (2009) dollars. Real GDP by state is an inflation-adjusted measure of each state's gross product that is based on national prices for the goods and services produced within that state. The statistics of real GDP by state and of quantity indexes with a reference year of 2009 were derived by applying national chain-type price indexes to the current-dollar values of GDP by state for the 64 detailed NAICS-based industries for 1997 forward.

The chain-type index formula that is used in the national accounts is then used to calculate the values of total real GDP by state and of real GDP by state at more aggregated industry levels. Real GDP by state may reflect a substantial volume of output that is sold to other states and countries. To the extent that a state's output is produced and sold in national markets at relatively uniform prices (or sold locally at national prices), real GDP by state captures the differences across states that reflect the relative differences in the mix of goods and services that the states produce. However, real GDP by state does not capture geographic differences in the prices of goods and services that are produced and sold locally.

Preliminary data from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis indicates the West Virginia real gross domestic product (GDP) expanded 5.1 percent between 2012 and 2013. The mining sector displayed a robust expansion of more than 40 percent over the previous period. While their employment represents a modest 4.3 percent of all industries employment, mining dollars contributed 16.9 percent to the state GDP. The second largest supporter of the state GDP is government with more than \$10 billion in revenue. This represents 15.6 percent of total GDP while their employment exceeds 19 percent of all industries. Other primary pieces of the state GDP include real estate and rental and leasing, which represents 9.5 percent of GDP, health care and social assistance, 9.4 percent, and manufacturing 9.4 percent.



Nonfarm Payroll Employment

Since 1990 nonfarm payroll employment in West Virginia, as represented in the graph below, has mirrored the national economy in the addition and subtraction of jobs. From 1990 forward there has been a fundamental shift from an abundance of goods-producing jobs, which typically pay a higher than average wage, to service-providing jobs that may pay average or less than average wages. An example of this shift can be found in the manufacturing sector in West Virginia, which employed more than 80,000 in 1990. By 2013 that total had fallen to less than 49,000. The loss of high paying, skilled occupations, has occurred across the country, however. Much of the loss can be attributed to U.S. companies meeting the challenge of inexpensive foreign products by shifting jobs overseas, thereby taking advantage of cheap labor. Offsetting these job losses were gains in the service-providing sector, most notably health services. These health care jobs nearly doubled between 1990 and 2013. The significance of health services occupations is, unlike many service-providing jobs, they typically pay a life sustaining wage and are stable in the long term. Other service-providing industries have performed well including leisure and hospitality, professional and business services and to a lesser degree, government.



West Virginia Nonfarm Payroll Employment Annual Averages 2000 – 2013




From 2000 to 2013, nonfarm payroll employment across the state continues to reflect changes occurring throughout the national economy. Fierce global competition has forced U.S. businesses to be creative in order to remain viable. Many have maintained their competitive edge by reducing the cost for labor, which generally translates in to moving business to another country where labor is less expensive. West Virginia businesses have mirrored this tactic, much to the regret of those who become unemployed as a result. The manufacturing sector has been the most apparent harbinger of job loss between 2000 and 2013, shrinking more than 36 percent. All goods producing businesses struggled to grow or simply maintain the status quo during this time frame. Construction employment was essentially flat and while mining and logging jobs will never again reach the levels of the 70's or earlier, they did expand more than 48 percent. Service providing businesses produced some of the more explicit job gains during this period. Educational and health service grew more than 26 percent, leisure and hospitality more than 20 percent, and government a little more than 7 percent.

Total Nonfarm Payroll Employment 2000/2013 (In thousands)




Percent of Total Nonfarm Payroll Employment 2013

Monongalia County reported the lowest annual average unemployment rate in the state in 2013. Only two counties, Monongalia (4.1) and Jefferson (4.6), recorded an average annual unemployment rate below 5.0 percent in 2013.

Clay and Webster counties reported the highest unemployment rate in the state, both at 11.5 percent. Counties with unemployment rates at or above ten percent included McDowell (10.0), Mason (10.1), Mingo (11.0), Clay (11.5), and Webster (11.5).


Between 2012 and 2013, fifty counties reported declining average annual unemployment rates, while three counties reported increasing unemployment rates, and the rates of two counties were unchanged.

The West Virginia worker earned an average of \$40,199 in 2013. The average annual wage in the state rose by \$478, an increase of 1.2 percent from 2012. Average annual employment decreased to 703,717 from 710,734, a loss of 7,017, or just slightly less than 1.0 percent. Major industry sectors that experienced growth included educational and health services (+516), trade, transportation, and utilities (+468), professional and business services (+298), and leisure and hospitality (+218). Sectors with employment declines included government (-4,248), natural resources and mining (-1,847), construction (-1,294), manufacturing (-675), other services (-124), information (-106), and financial activities (-94).

A survey of wages based on four-digit NAICS codes shows securities and commodity contracts brokerage firms (5231) paid the highest average annual wage among the state's industries with an average of \$133,644, followed by power generation and supply (2211) \$87,911, druggists' goods merchant wholesaler (4242) \$86,176, resin, rubber, and artificial fibers manufacturing (3252) \$85,757, and coal mining (2121) \$84,958.

Boone County continued to report the highest average annual wage at \$50,670, followed by Marshall \$50,352, Mingo \$47,600, McDowell \$46,256, Wyoming \$45,160, Putnam \$45,049, Pleasants \$44,347, Lewis \$44,225, Monongalia \$44,010, and Harrison \$43,036. Counties with an annual average wage below \$30,000 included Wetzel \$29,934, Hampshire \$29,574, Hardy \$29,487, Summers \$28, 696, Pocahontas \$28, 199, Tucker \$26,516, and Wirt \$25,899.

The five counties with the largest growth in employment were Berkeley (+762), Monongalia (+630), Taylor (+365), Brooke (+350), and Harrison (+314).

Based on data that include all workers covered by state and federal unemployment insurance programs, these statistics are updated each quarter on our website under the section marked Industry Data/Employment and Wages. Also included are data on average annual employment, average annual and weekly wages, and the number of employers by detailed industry for the state and each of its 55 counties.



Note: An *establishment* is a single physical location, such as an individual store or restaurant. An *employer* may have any number of establishments at different locations. Firms which do not have employees covered by unemployment compensation are not included. Firms are sized according to their employment in West Virginia. This means that a firm with many thousands of employees nationwide, but only a few salespeople in West Virginia, is counted as a very small firm.

Percent Change in Annual Average Private Sector Units 2002 - 2013

The graph below illustrates the growth and decline of establishments in West Virginia between 2002 and 2013. The decade began with declines in both 2002 and 2003. However, the year 2004 saw an increase of nearly 700 establishments, a gain of 1.6 percent. Growth remained positive through 2008. During the national recession of 2009, West Virginia lost just over 500 establishments, a decline of 1.1 percent. The years 2010 and 2011 saw a slow recovery, but the year 2012 brought the addition of just over 800 establishments, an increase of 1.8 percent, and the strongest growth in over a decade. The state added just over 200 establishments in 2013, an increase of just less than one-half of one percent.

Industry Employment Projections

West Virginia 2012 - 2022

Industry employment projections for West Virginia for the years 2012-2022 reflect the continuing loss of high-wage manufacturing jobs to global competition, but also reveal the expansion of other industries that contribute to a healthy economy. Data for the state indicate an overall gain of 4.9 percent in total employment, or additional employment of approximately 38,600 over the ten-year period. Crucial losses are projected to occur in mining (-7.4%) and manufacturing (-2.8%). Mining employment is expected to decline roughly 2,400, while manufacturing losses are expected to reach nearly 1,400. Oil and gas industry employment is expected to grow by 17.0 percent, adding nearly 400 jobs but unable to offset a loss of 3,866 in mining, except oil and gas (-16.4%). Manufacturing industries expected to decline precipitously include Textile Product Mills (-34.8%); Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing (-32.4%); Beverage and Tobacco Product Manufacturing (-29.9%); Primary Metal manufacturing (-24.2%); Printing and Related Support Activities (-19.9%); and Petroleum and Coal Products Manufacturing (-19.7%). Wood Product Manufacturing is expected to add nearly 1,200 jobs during this period, a growth rate of 26.9 percent.

Health Care and Social Assistance industries are expected to add 22,626 jobs, a growth rate of 18.2 percent. Particular industries expecting healthy growth include Ambulatory Health Care Services (+39.0%) and Nursing and Residential Care Facilities (+12.7%). Other industry sectors expecting modest employment growth over the period include Social Assistance (+8.8%); Administrative and Support Services (+17.7%); Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+14.3%); Data Processing, Hosting and Related Services (+23.1%); and Construction of Buildings (+16.9%).

Demand Occupations

The following is a list of occupations expected to be in demand through 2022 in West Virginia. Demand occupations are defined as those occupations exhibiting positive growth and a high number of projected annual openings. Nearly one-half of the demand occupations listed are related to healthcare and social services, which is reflective of West Virginia's aging population and the increased needs of the "baby-boom" generation as it continues to transition out of the workforce over the coming decade. The occupations on this list require varying levels of education and training, from a Doctoral or professional degree, to less than a high school diploma with more than one year of moderate-term on-the-job training. Demand occupations requiring a Doctoral or professional degree include lawyers; pharmacists; and physical therapists. A few of the listed occupations require an Associate, Bachelor's, or Master's degree, such as accountants and auditors, management analysts, civil engineers, teachers, registered nurses, etc. Many of the demand occupations listed require a high school diploma or equivalent with at least some on-the-job training. These occupations include, but are not limited to industrial machinery mechanics, pharmacy technicians, medical assistants, carpenters, construction equipment operators, and home health aides, etc.
