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Highlights of recent TA

...About a year and half ago, DOL began some technical assistance efforts to reconnect Unemployment Insurance (UI) claimants to reemployment opportunities. One question that came up was **how are regions tapping the unemployed worker segment of their talent pool?** This generated more questions like -- **are they being connected to growth occupations?** Are regions doing **skills based matching and analysis?** What **jobs are growing** and how do we **connect the unemployed** to these opportunities on the other side of the economic downturn? check out this Webinar recording and [PowerPoint](#)

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the jobs picture.

- **Los Angeles County's jobs picture mirrors the five-county region that also includes Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and Ventura counties.** The region saw a 6.5 percent drop in jobs last year, with a 1.5 percent decrease expected in 2010.
- **When does it get better?** Long Beach State study says next year will bring an improvement of 0.7 percent with a 1.9 percent rise in 2012.



- Employment in **wholesale trade** as well as the combined sector of **transportation, warehousing & utilities** will moderate this year and eventually improve in 2012 after shedding thousands of jobs in 2009, the forecast says.
- **Manufacturing** is also moderating this year after seeing losses of 10 percent or more for durable and nondurable goods in 2009. Both sectors will continue to see lower job losses until 2012, when growth will start, the study says.
- For **state and local government**, the job picture is expected to worsen as the private sector improves. State and local government job losses will accelerate this year after a mild 2009 decline of 0.6 percent. In 2010, the county will see an additional 3.1 percent drop.

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
